strengthen us in all goodness,


and by the power of the Holy Spirit keep us in eternal life.

PRAYER OF THE DAY


Let us pray.

GOSPEL READING Mark 14:22-42

The holy gospel according to St. Mark, the fourteenth chapter.

Glory to you, O Lord.

²²While they were eating, he took a loaf of bread, and after blessing it he broke it, gave it to them, and said, "Take; this is my body." ²³Then he took a cup, and after giving thanks he gave it to them, and all of them drank from it. ²⁴He said to them, "This is my blood of the covenant, which is poured out for many. ²⁵Truly I tell you, I will never again drink of the fruit of the vine until that day when I drink it new in the kingdom of God."

²⁶When they had sung the hymn, they went out to the Mount of Olives. ²⁷And Jesus said to them, "You will all become deserters; for it is written,

'I will strike the shepherd, and the sheep will be scattered.'

²⁸But after I am raised up, I will go before you to Galilee." ²⁹Peter said to him, "Even though all become deserters, I will not." ³⁰Jesus said to him, "Truly I tell you, this day, this very night, before the cock crows twice, you will deny me three times." ³¹But he said vehemently, "Even though I must die with you, I will not deny you." And all of them said the same. *(continued)*

³²They went to a place called Gethsemane; and he said to his disciples, "Sit here while I pray." ³³He took with him Peter and James and John, and began to be distressed and agitated. ³⁴And he said to them, "I am deeply grieved, even to death; remain here, and keep awake." ³⁵And going a little farther, he threw himself on the ground and prayed that, if it were possible, the hour might pass from him. ³⁶He said, "Abba, Father, for you all things are possible; remove this cup from me; yet, not what I want, but what you want."


³⁷He came and found them sleeping; and he said to Peter, "Simon, are you asleep? Could you not keep awake one hour? ³⁸Keep awake and pray that you may not come into the time of trial; the spirit indeed is willing, but the flesh is weak." ³⁹And again he went away and prayed, saying the same words. ⁴⁰And once more he came and found them sleeping, for their eyes were very heavy; and they did not know what to say to him. ⁴¹He came a third time and said to them, "Are you still sleeping and taking your rest? Enough! The hour has come; the Son of Man is betrayed into the hands of sinners. ⁴²Get up, let us be going. See, my betrayer is at hand."



OFFERING PRAYER

Let us pray.

Bless these gifts that we have gathered that all people may know your goodness. Feed us not only with your holy food but with hunger for justice and peace. We pray this in your name. Amen.

THE GREAT THANKSGIVING

The Lord be with you. And also with you. Lift up your hearts. We lift them to the Lord. Let us give thanks to the Lord our God. It is right to give our thanks and praise.

It is right, Loving God, that we lift up to you all thanks and praise for the self-giving love that you lavish upon us.

Tonight we remember, with reverence, the unshakeable love your Son had for his followers; how he lovingly washed their feet, demonstrating the kind of love that we are called to show one another. Love is your supreme act of creation, a force that is unstoppable even in the face of betrayal and death. Together, we declare your praise saying:

Holy, holy Lord, God of power and might, heaven and earth are full of your glory.
Hosanna in the highest.
Blessed is the One who comes in the name of the Lord.

This night, on which he was betrayed, Jesus gathered his friends for a meal. He took bread, gave thanks, broke it, gave it to them and said, take and eat, this is my body, broken for you; do this in remembrance of me.

Again, after supper he took the cup; gave thanks and gave it to all to drink saying, "This cup is the new covenant in my blood given and shed for you for the forgiveness of your sins; do this in remembrance of me.

Together we proclaim the mystery of faith:

Christ has died, Christ has risen, Christ will come again.

Let us pray.

Gracious God, you call us to love one another, just as you have loved us. May this meal be a source of inspiration and courage that we might follow your example and lavish love upon one another, not just in the moments when it is easy, but especially during the times when it is hard. Send your Spirit to abide with us, that we might be transformed by your presence, and be nourished for the journey ahead.

All are welcome at the Lord's Table.

We rejoice with Elsa, Dylan, Grace and Nora, who are receiving their first communion this evening.

Communion will be served from the kneelers at the front of the sanctuary. Ushers will direct you forward for distribution. You will receive the host to eat and then wine (red) or juice (white) from an individual communion cup. Gluten-free wafers are available. Please indicate your need to the server.

Anyone choosing to not commune is welcome to come forward and receive a blessing. If you would like communion brought to you in the pew, please let an Usher know.






