SERVICE OF LIGHT AND DARKNESS Good Friday March 29, 2024

In the Tenebrae (Latin for "darkness") service presented here, the extinguishing of candles and stripping of the altar have been placed within the reading of the Passion according to Mark, the gospel narrative for the day.

Rather than "mourning" the dying or dead Jesus on Good Friday, the cross is acclaimed as the sign of the world's redemption. With the procession of the cross, we offer honor and reverence to the One who, lifted up from the earth, draws all people to himself. Already on Good Friday, the church celebrates the mystery of the dying and rising of Jesus the Christ as the central event of our salvation.

Let us pray.

Son of God, your suffering for our sin is great. We offer you all that we have and all that we are. Restore us as we are reminded that we are redeemed because of all you have done. Amen.

BIDDING PRAYER

The assembly kneels or sits. The assisting minister leads the invitations to prayer (the bids). Silence for prayer follows each bid. A bowl will toll for silence. The presiding minister leads the prayers that conclude the silence.

A: Let us pray, brothers and sisters, for the holy church throughout the world.

Bell will toll for silent prayer.

P: Almighty and eternal God,

you have shown your glory to all nations in Jesus Christ.

By your Holy Spirit guide the church and gather it throughout the world.

Help it to persevere in faith, proclaim your name,

and bring the good news of salvation in Christ to all people.

We ask this through Christ our Lord.

Amen.

A: Let us pray for *Elizabeth and Ann* our bishops, for *Mark* our pastor, for all servants of the church, and for all the people of God.

Bell will toll for silent prayer.

P: Almighty and eternal God, your Spirit guides the church and makes it holy. Strengthen and uphold our bishops, pastors, other ministers and lay leaders. Keep them in health and safety for the good of the church, and help each of us in our various vocations to do faithfully the work to which you have called us.

We ask this through Christ our Lord.

Amen.

A: Let us pray for our sisters and brothers who share our faith in Jesus Christ.

Bell will toll for silent prayer.

P: Almighty and eternal God, you give your church unity.

Look with favor on all who follow Jesus your Son.

Make all the baptized one in the fullness of faith,

and keep us united in the fellowship of love.

We ask this through Christ our Lord.

Amen.

A: Let us pray for the Jewish people, the first to hear the word of God.

Bell will toll for silent prayer.

P: Almighty and eternal God,

long ago you gave your promise to Abraham and your teaching to Moses.

Hear our prayers that the people you called and elected as your own may receive the fulfillment of the covenant's promises.

We ask this through Christ our Lord.

Amen.

A: Let us pray for those who do not share our faith in Jesus Christ.

Bell will toll for silent prayer.

P: Almighty and eternal God, gather into your embrace all those who call out to you under different names. Bring an end to inter-religious strife and make us more faithful witnesses of the love made

known to us in your Son. We ask this through Christ our Lord.

Amen.

A: Let us pray for those who do not believe in God.

Bell will toll for silent prayer.

P: Almighty and eternal God, you created humanity so that all may long to know you and find peace in you. Grant that all may recognize the signs of your love and grace in the world and in the lives of Christians, and gladly acknowledge you as the one true God. We ask this through Christ our Lord.

Amen.

A: Let us pray for those who serve in public office.

Bell will toll for silent prayer.

P: Almighty and eternal God, you are the champion of the poor and oppressed. In your goodness, give wisdom to those in authority, so that all people may enjoy justice, peace, freedom, and a share in the goodness of your creation. We ask this through Christ our Lord.

Amen.

A: Let us pray for those in need.

Bell will toll for silent prayer.

P: Almighty and eternal God, you give strength to the weary and new courage to those who have lost heart. Heal the sick, comfort the dying, give safety to travelers, free those unjustly deprived of liberty, and deliver your world from falsehood, hunger, and disease. Hear the prayers of all who call on you in any trouble, that they may have the joy of receiving your help in their need. We ask this through Christ our Lord.

Amen.

P: Finally, let us pray for all those things for which our Lord would have us ask.

Our Father in heaven,
hallowed be your name,
your kingdom come,
your will be done, on earth as in heaven.

Give us today our daily bread.

Forgive us our sins as we forgive those who sin against us.

Save us from the time of trial and deliver us from evil.

For the kingdom, the power, and the glory are yours, now and forever. Amen.

THE PASSION ACCORDING TO ST. MARK

Mark 15:16-20

¹⁶Then the soldiers led him into the courtyard of the palace (that is, the governor's headquarters); and they called together the whole cohort. ¹⁷And they clothed him in a purple cloak; and after twisting some thorns into a crown, they put it on him. ¹⁸And they began saluting him, "Hail, King of the Jews!" ¹⁹They struck his head with a reed, spat upon him, and knelt down in homage to him. ²⁰After mocking him, they stripped him of the purple cloak and put his own clothes on him. Then they led him out to crucify him.

Mark 15:21-24

²¹They compelled a passer-by, who was coming in from the country, to carry his cross; it was Simon of Cyrene, the father of Alexander and Rufus. ²²Then they brought Jesus to the place called Golgotha (which means the place of a skull). ²³And they offered him wine mixed with myrrh; but he did not take it. ²⁴And they crucified him, and divided his clothes among them, casting lots to decide what each should take.

Second candles are extinguished.

Mark 15:25-27

²⁵It was nine o'clock in the morning when they crucified him. ²⁶The inscription of the charge against him read, "The King of the Jews." ²⁷And with him they crucified two bandits, one on his right and one on his left.

Mark 15:29-32

²⁹Those who passed by derided him, shaking their heads and saying, "Aha! You who would destroy the temple and build it in three days, ³⁰save yourself, and come down from the cross!" ³¹In the same way the chief priests, along with the scribes, were also mocking him among themselves and saying, "He saved others; he cannot save himself. ³²Let the Messiah, the King of Israel, come down from the cross now, so that we may see and believe." Those who were crucified with him also taunted him.

Fourth candles are extinguished.

³³When it was noon, darkness came over the whole land until three in the afternoon. ³⁴At three o'clock Jesus cried out with a loud voice, "Eloi, Eloi, lema sabachthani?" which means, "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?"

³⁵When some of the bystanders heard it, they said, "Listen, he is calling for Elijah." ³⁶And someone ran, filled a sponge with sour wine, put it on a stick, and gave it to him to drink, saying, "Wait, let us see whether Elijah will come to take him down."

Fifth candles are extinguished.

Sixth candles are extinguished.

Meditation

Silence for reflection follows.

READING Psalm 22:1-2, 14-19

¹My God, my God, why have you forsaken me? Why are you so far from helping me, from the words of my groaning? ²O my God, I cry by day, but you do not answer; and by night, but find no rest.

¹⁴I am poured out like water, and all my bones are out of joint; my heart is like wax; it is melted within my breast; ¹⁵my mouth is dried up like a potsherd, and my tongue sticks to my jaws; you lay me in the dust of death. ¹⁶For dogs are all around me; a company of evildoers encircles me. My hands and feet have shriveled; ¹⁷I can count all my bones. They stare and gloat over me; ¹⁸they divide my clothes among themselves, and for my clothing they cast lots. ¹⁹But you, O LORD, do not be far away! O my help, come quickly to my aid!

A moment of silence

PROCESSION OF THE CROSS

P: We will glory in the cross of our Lord Jesus Christ,

C: in whom is our salvation, our life, and resurrection.

P: Let us pray.

C: Mercifully assist us, O Lord God of our salvation, that we may remember with joy the mighty acts whereby you have given us life everlasting; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Please stand, turn, and face the cross.

The following dialogue is spoken three times.

Behold, the life-giving cross,

on which was hung the Savior of the whole world.

After each iteration of dialogue, a bell will toll for silence.

We adore you, O Christ, and we bless you.

By your holy cross you have redeemed the world.

Bell will toll for silent prayer.

The flame from the Christ Candle is taken onto a candlelighter, then the Christ candle is extinguished.

As the life of Christ is extinguished, the light of the Christ Candle is put out.

The Light of Christ exits and eternal flame is extinguished.

Bell will toll for silent prayer.

The room is made nearly completely dark as though we are in the tomb with Christ.

The Light of Christ returns and the Christ candle is relit.

We remain in silent darkness for some time.

When the lights are turned on the service has ended.

Please remain silent until you have reached your vehicles.






